**Venmo:** Pay and receive money from other people in a secure way with Venmo. It links your bank account to the app, so you can directly exchange money for that taco you had last night or for groceries a friend picked up for you. CashApp is also another good option.

**Uber/Lyft:** These ridesharing apps are useful when going someplace the bus system doesn't reach or when a car is not available. Within minutes, a ride comes straight to your location and drops you off directly where you want after paying a few dollars. Be sure to exercise caution when using these however! **LiveSafe:** LiveSafe is not the most exciting app, but it is great for situations like calling campus police and getting emergency preparedness tips. Plus, if you're ever nervous about traveling alone at night to Lee from the library, you can have a friend "watch you," via their phone, arrive safely.

2. Keep in touch with people back home. With modern technology, it's easy to talk to people hundreds of miles away. Whether you're an international student, from out-of-state, or you were born and raised in Blacksburg, there is always going to be someone who will be happy that you called them.

3. Remember that you're not alone! Even though I'm a sophomore and I've been through this whole process before, I definitely cried a little when my family dropped me off after move-in. If you're feeling homesick, it's okay to reach out to a friend, your mentor, or an upperclassman! We've all felt that way at some point in time, and sometimes the best way to cope with being homesick is finding someone that can relate to you.

**Canvas:** This is the mobile version of the Canvas you use often for classes. It is perfect for viewing announcements professors made, checking the grade you got on the homework, or for skimming your class syllabus.

**Hokie Mobile:** View the latest Virginia Tech news and events, your dining plan balances, as well as your class schedule in a few touches with Hokie Mobile. It is designed for quick glances, but for more specific information use your computer.

**Google Maps:** This may seem self-explanatory, but it is a lifesaver for when you don't know where a specific building is on campus. It is also useful for planning out your Blacksburg Transit bus ride to Kroger or to Christiansburg.

**Blacksburg Transit:** This app will help you hack the bus system. It shows all of the routes as well as the live location for the bus to help make sure you never miss it! It is really helpful when planning trips on and off campus like to go to Math Empo or Kroger.

**Grubhub**: Grubhub Campus Dining is similar to last semester's **Tapingo**, however, as of right now, it does not seem to be up and running. The app allows you to order food from any dining hall and have it be picked up when it is done, all while avoiding the lines in your favorite spots. It uses money from your dining plan account and notifies you when your favorite meal is ready to eat.
